The Chair noted the location of the Open Meetings Act and opened the meeting at 8:34 a.m.

**AGENDA ITEM**

**1) APPROVAL OF STAFF MEETING MINUTES FOR JANUARY 23, 2020**

**MOTION:** Schor moved and Yoakum seconded approval of the January 23, 2020 Staff Meeting minutes. Vest, Amundson, Schorr, Yoakum and Flowerday voted yes. Motion carried 5-0.

**2) LEGISLATIVE UPDATE – Joe Kohout and Brennen Miller, Kissel, Kohout, ES Associates LLC**

Joe Kohout and Brennen Miller, Kissel, Kohout, ES Associates, LLC, discussed the weekly report (Exhibit 1), legislative bills (Exhibit 2) and the hearing schedule (Exhibit 3). Kohout suggested the Board may want to make LB 267 a priority. It was noted LB 230 has moved to final reading and contains a county jail component.

Regarding LB 1171, Corrections Director Brad Johnson said it would have a large fiscal impact as it would allow women with children two and under to reside with them while incarcerated. This would involve 15 to 20 kids in Lancaster County, and would require construction, programming, pre-school, etc., as well as an increase in staff.

Kohout indicated he would further discuss LB 1007 after the County Attorneys and Criminal Defense Bar meet.

LB 1017, which establishes mental health problem solving courts, will be heard Wednesday, February 5<sup>th</sup>. County Attorney Pat Condon expressed concern that after an offender goes through the program, there is still a need for further services for the person that may not be addressed or available. Kim Etherton, Community Corrections Director, said there is no evidence that mental health courts result in positive outcomes. She was concerned that it could criminalize mental health.

Amundson noted that while the goal is good, she was also concerned if it will work. Condon said he thought more judicial resources might be needed.

**MOTION:** Amundson moved and Yoakum seconded to support LB 1017. Amundson, Schorr, Yoakum, Vest, and Flowerday voted yes. Motion carried 5-0.

Kohout also gave brief status of LB's 1095, 941, 1117, 1148, 1056, 298, 999, 1057, 781, 1169.

Vest exited at 9:01 a.m. and returned at 9:03 a.m.

Kohut suggested the County Board take a position on LB 1057 – the Nebraska Association of County Officials (NACO) bill that was introduced on behalf of Lancaster County.

**MOTION:** Schorr moved and Yoakum seconded a motion to support LB 1057. Schorr, Yoakum, Vest, Amundson and Flowerday voted yes. Motion carried 5-0.

**3) LANCASTER COUNTY LEADERSHIP ACADEMY ONBOARDING PROPOSAL – Ann Ames, Deputy Chief Administrative Officer**

Ann Ames, Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, gave an update on an onboarding proposal developed by the inaugural Lancaster County Leadership Academy. Those in attendance who were involved in developing the proposal included Cari Forbes, County Clerk's Office; Jenny DeBoer, County Extension Office; Nicole Miller, Clerk of the District Court/Jury Commission; John Vik, County Sheriff's Office; and Sadie Jensen, Community Corrections.

The group presented a PowerPoint (Exhibit 4). The goals included employee engagement and retention and bringing some consistency to various agency cultures. It was noted the cost for such a proposal would be inexpensive in comparison to hiring or re-hire staff when turnover occurs.

The County Board was generally supportive of the proposal and Daisy Brayton, Human Resources Coordinator, said the Human Resources Department is as well. She offered to continue meeting with the group to develop next steps.

A copy of the City of Lincoln new employee orientation packet was distributed (Exhibit 5).

**4) CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER SEARCH – Chad Thies, Zelle HR Solutions President; and Doug McDaniel, Human Resources Director**

Chad Thies and Hannah Engelbrecht from Zelle Human Resource Solutions were present.

Schorr said she worked with Zelle on the NACO Executive Director search and was pleased with their service.

Thies summarized a proposal to assist with finding a new Chief Administrative Officer (Exhibit 6). He estimated the process could take three to six months.

Vest inquired how the NACO search was accomplished. Thies said the CAO search process would be similar whereby Zelle would utilize personal contacts as well as other means to generate candidates. Schorr said the Board needs to develop a job description. Flowerday suggested developing a good vision of what the Board is seeking in a CAO. Thies said Zelle can also assist with this task.

**MOTION:** Amundson moved and Schorr seconded to develop a contract with Zelle Human Resource Solutions to assist the County Board with hiring a new Chief Administrative Officer. Yoakum, Vest, Amundson, Schorr and Flowerday voted yes. Motion carried 5-0.

Thies said the cost would be \$15,000, plus the cost of posting the position on several sites which could be an additional \$1,000.

**5) INTRODUCTION OF CHRISTOPHER TURNER, JUVENILE DIVISION CHIEF DEPUTY COUNTY ATTORNEY – Pat Condon, County Attorney**

County Attorney Pat Condon introduced Christopher Turner, Chief Deputy County Attorney in the Juvenile Division. Turner provided a brief overview of the Juvenile Division.

Schorr exited the meeting at 10:15 a.m.

**6) UPTRUST SERVICE AGREEMENT (TEXT REMINDERS) – Joe Nigro, Public Defender**

Public Defender Joe Nigro discussed a proposed agreement with Uptrust to send out text reminders to offenders about their upcoming court dates. He noted Uptrust has experienced good results working with other public defenders. With the reminders, there is potential for reducing the number of people not showing for their court appearances which, in turn, can reduce costs associated with additional court filings, arrests, etc.

Nigro indicated that Uptrust will provide a grant for this service at no cost for the first year. The County may choose to contract with them for the service after that time.

**MOTION:** Yoakum moved and Amundson seconded approval of the Uptrust Agreement. Yoakum, Amundson, Vest and Flowerday voted yes. Schorr was absent. Motion carried 4-0.

**7) MID-YEAR BUDGET AGENDA – Dennis Meyer, Budget & Fiscal Officer**

Dennis Meyer, Budget & Fiscal Officer, reminded the County Board about the Mid-Year Budget meeting on Thursday, February 6<sup>th</sup>. He will be discussing the centralization for payroll functions, additional appropriations, requests for additional full-time equivalents (FTEs), future technology funding and the County Code project. Meyer noted there is approximately \$1.5 million in additional budget requests for the remaining fiscal year.

Vest exited the meeting at 10:36 a.m. and returned at 10:39 a.m.

The Chair recessed the meeting at 10:40 a.m.

**8) EXECUTIVE SESSION (PENDING LITIGATION, LABOR NEGOTIATIONS, AND LEGAL ADVICE)** – Jen Holloway, Deputy County Attorney; and Dan Zieg, Deputy County Attorney; Doug McDaniel, Human Resources Director; Kristy Bauer, Deputy County Attorney; and Pam Dingman, County Engineer

**MOTION:** Amundson moved and Yoakum seconded to enter Executive Session at 10:45 a.m. for the purposes of pending litigation, labor negotiations, and receiving legal advice and to protect the public interest.

The Chair said it has been moved and seconded that the Board enter Executive Session.

**ROLL CALL:** Amundson, Vest, Yoakum and Flowerday voted yes. Schorr was absent. Motion carried 4-0.

The Chair restated the purpose for the Board entering Executive Session.

Yoakum exited the meeting.

**MOTION:** Amundson moved and Vest seconded to exit Executive Session at 11:21 a.m. Vest, Amundson and Flowerday voted yes. Schorr and Yoakum were absent. Motion carried 3-0.

**9) CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER REPORT**

**A. Tour of Lincoln Sports Foundation Complex**

Kerry Eagan, Chief Administrative Officer, said he would schedule further discussion on the Lincoln Sports Foundation Complex tour on the February 13<sup>th</sup> staff meeting agenda.

**B. NACO Institute of Excellence**

Eagan said Community Corrections Director Kim Etherton would like to participate in the NACO Institute of Excellence. Board consensus was to support this request.

**C. Prudential 2019 Year-End Investment Review**

Eagan said Prudential's year-end report will be scheduled for the March 26<sup>th</sup> staff meeting.

**10) DEPUTY CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER REPORT**

**A. Discussion of Commissioners' Award of Excellence Administration**

Ames discussed the Commissioners Award of Excellence program and recommended that Human Resources continue the program's administration. She added this could be reviewed again after the new payroll system has been implemented.

## 11) DISCUSSION OF BOARD MEMBER MEETINGS ATTENDED

### A. **Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Oversight Authority Board Meeting** - Monday, January 27, 2020, Flowerday

Flowerday said CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) survival rates in the community have increased the past five years. This has occurred with the use of dispatcher assisted CPR and AEDs (automated external defibrillators). Challenges still exist in the rural areas with EMS response times not being as fast as in the City of Lincoln.

### B. **County Board Chair/Vice Chair Monthly Meeting with Planning**- Tuesday, January 28, 2020, Flowerday / Vest

Vest said there may be some minor changes to the CAFO (Combined Animal Feeding Operation) text amendment. He added a solar application will be presented at a March Planning Commission meeting.



RE: Weekly Report

Good Morning. Please accept this as your weekly report for the 2020 session of the Legislature for the date noted above.

We would note that today is day 15 of the 2020 session. This means that after today, we are 25% of the way through the 2020 session. The Legislature continues its process of debating legislation advanced to General or Select File in the mornings with Committee Hearings in the afternoons.

**LANCASTER COUNTY PRIORITIES**

**LB267 (Bolz) Provide a duty for the county board relating to deficient bridges and authorize a tax levy.** This would allow for financing of County Bridges under Neb. Rev. Stat. 23-120(3)(b). Introduced during the 2019 session by Senator Bolz, the bill currently sits on General File after unanimously advancing from the Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee. Discussions are ongoing seeking a priority designation for the bill, which will assist in moving it towards floor debate by the full body.

The bill has been placed on the agenda this week and has appeared there on Tuesday, Wednesday and today. We may get to it in the natural course of things not requiring a priority designation.

**LB335 (M. Hansen) Authorize a 24/7 sobriety program permit for operating a motor vehicle as a condition of bail.** Statutory Changes to Implement Statewide 24/7 Sobriety Program. Introduced by Senator Matt Hansen during the 2019 session, LB335 currently sits in the Judiciary Committee. This interim brought conversations with opposition, which brought fruitful developments towards producing an amendment. We are awaiting a response on the redline in the coming days.

**Amend the Mental Health Commitment Act to allow Sharing of Mental Health Information Among Providers and Law Enforcement Agencies.** After numerous

meetings with stakeholders over the interim, produced by LR183 introduced by Senator Geist, the initial draft and subsequent revisions were received back from the revisers' office and forwarded to interested parties for review. During her discussions with the State Patrol, it became clear to Senator Geist that the Patrol would be placing a fiscal note on the bill and also be appearing in an opposition position. Too, the Patrol believed it necessary to obtain an Attorney General's opinion on the bill regarding the release of records. As such, Senator Geist has indicated that she would like to hold off on introduction of the bill this session as she believed that the workload of the Judiciary Committee would not provide the necessary bandwidth to get the bill passed this session.

**LB247 (Bolz) Adopt the Advance Mental Health Care Directives Act.** Adopt the Advance Mental Health Care Directives Act under LB247. Introduced by Senator Bolz during the 2019 session, the bill is held by the Judiciary Committee. In our conversations with the senator, she has indicated that she has possibly reached a tentative agreement with opposition parties including the Bar Association on language to address their concerns, and to advance the bill early this session for consideration by the full body.

### **BILLS IDENTIFIED BY DEPARTMENT HEADS & ELECTED OFFICIALS**

**Brad Johnson: LB230 (Pansing-Brooks) Provide for room confinement of juveniles as prescribed. NEUTRAL.** Under LB230, additional rules are mandated to juvenile facilities regarding placement in room confinement of a juvenile in a juvenile facility specifically, room confinement of a juvenile for longer than one hour during a twenty-four-hour period shall be documented and approved in writing by a supervisor in the juvenile facility. It is the intent and purpose of this rule shall not be avoided by the use of consecutive periods of room confinement. New rules relating to confinement are outlined in the bill also, for example, notice to the juvenile's parent or guardian, rooms having adequate lighting, amongst others.

When a similar measure was introduced in 2017, Commissioners Brinkman and Schorr met with Senator Pansing-Brooks to discuss the bill. The Board did request that we meet with Senator Pansing-Brooks to discuss a requirement in the bill requiring continuous monitoring. She indicated that she is willing to clarify the record on the continuous monitoring language of the bill to mean electronic or every 15 minutes.

The Judiciary Committee did advance LB230 with a committee amendment attached (AM450). The bill was not prioritized during the 2019 Session.

The bill was debated on General File on Tuesday of this week. The bill was advanced after an hour or so of debate following adoption of AM450. There was some concern raised on the floor regarding the potential impact of a juvenile being placed into a county jail. AM2121 was adopted on Select File and the bill was moved to Final Reading.

**Brad Johnson: LB1171 (Cavanaugh) Change provisions under the Healthy Pregnancies for Incarcerated Women Act** The bill expresses the strong intent for the Legislature to keep mothers and infants together in correctional settings. The bill would require the construction of a nursery. Requires for allowing a mother to lactate and express and provide that milk to their infant. HEARING SET FOR WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 12, 2020

**Joe Nigro: LB1007 (Hansen, M.) Change provisions relating to competency to stand trial and be sentenced.** The bill makes significant changes to the competency provisions and individuals charged with crimes. In some cases, it would require dismissal by the

court and order to competency restoration. In other cases it would require a competency restoration. HEARING SET FOR FRIDAY, JANUARY 31, 2020.

**Joe Nigro: LB1017 (Geist) Appropriate funds to the Supreme Court.** Appropriates \$617,788 in FY2020-21, \$767,788 in FY2021-22 and 767,788 in FY2022-23 to the Supreme Court to provide for a pilot program for a mental health, problem solving court. HEARING SET FOR WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 5, 2020.

**Sara Hoyle: LB1095 (McDonnell) Authorize counties containing a city of the metropolitan class to establish juvenile justice programs and services.** The bill would give a general, specific power to counties containing a city of the metropolitan class (Douglas) the ability to establish specific juvenile justice programs and simultaneously give them ordinance authority to do the same. Douglas County brought this concept up at tri-county. HEARING SET FOR THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 6, 2020.

**Kerry Eagan: LB941 (Hunt) Create the Nebraska Youth in Care Bill of Rights.** Creates the Nebraska Youth in Care Bill of Rights; It is the policy of the Legislature to ensure that the quality of care provided to children placed in foster family homes, juvenile facilities, or child-care institutions is as close as possible to the care a child would receive in a family setting. This is accomplished by honest and clear communication and information to help them understand the system or systems in which they are involved, to provide consistent opportunities for such children to have their voices heard in their cases, to successfully reunify children with their families or help such children find permanency, to support lifelong family connections for such children, to place such children in an environment accepting of their cultures and beliefs, and to provide such children with the skills, knowledge, and resources they need to become successful adults. HEARING SET FOR THURSDAY, JANUARY 30, 2020

**Kerry Eagan: LB1117 (Pansing Brooks) Change sentencing provisions for crimes committed by a person under twenty-one years of age and change provisions relating to jurisdiction over juveniles.** The bill makes a series of changes to the provisions at the age of individuals could be for purposes conviction and the minimum and maximum sentences. The bill, most significantly for Lancaster County, would allow for county court and juvenile court to take jurisdiction of cases where the age of the person at the time of the commission of the crime was 16 or 17 years of age. HEARING SET FOR THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 13, 2020

**Kerry Eagan: LB1148 (Vargas) Change provisions relating to the Office of Juvenile Services and the placement of juveniles at youth rehabilitation and treatment centers.** The bill appears to be a response to the issues raised following action by the Department in the fall to house individuals at the Lancaster County Youth detention facility. It includes provisions that would prohibit the use of the secure detention facility by the state on page 18 at lines 5 – 8. HEARING SET FOR THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 6, 2020

### **HEARINGS IN THE COMING WEEK**

Monday, February 3, 2020

General Affairs Committee

**LB1056 (Lowe) Provide for temporary expansion of licensed premises under the Nebraska Liquor Control Act.** The bill was introduced in response to a number

of increases provided to the Liquor Control Commission on SDLs. It would allow for an temporary expansion of a currently licensed premise so that it would not require an SDL.

Tuesday, February 4, 2020

Executive Board

**LR298 (Howard) Provide the Executive Board appoint a special committee of the Legislature to be known as the Youth Rehabilitation and Treatment Center Special Oversight Committee of the Legislature.** Resolution calls for a special committee to oversee the business plan of DHHS to address the YRTCs. The Executive Board of the Legislative Council would appoint it but it would include 3 individuals from the HHS Committee, 1 from Education, 1 from Appropriations, 3 from Judiciary, and 1 at-large member.

Urban Affairs

**LB999 (Wayne) Require cities and villages to pay for appointed counsel for prosecutions and adjudications for violation of city and village ordinances.** This bill requires a city of village to reimburse the public defender or contracting attorney in a prosecution for a violation of a city of village ordinance. This includes the proportionate share of the appointed counsel's salary, any expenses, trial expenses, and expert witness fees. In adjudication for a violation of a city or village ordinance, the governing body of such city or village shall allow the account, bill, or claim presented by any attorney or guardian ad litem for services performed in the amount determined by the court

Wednesday, February 5, 2020

Government, Military & Veterans Affairs Committee

**LB1057 (Lowe) Change provisions regarding appeals of certain zoning decisions by county planning commissions and county boards.** The bill is introduced by Senator Lowe at the request of NACO but originated from Lancaster County.

Health & Human Services Committee

**LB1140 (HHS) Provide requirements for youth rehabilitation and treatment centers.** The bill defines and provides for the role of YRTCs.

**LB1141 (HHS) Require the Department of Health and Human Services to develop operations plans for the youth rehabilitation and treatment centers.** The bill would require DHHS to come up with operational plans at the YRTCs and provides specifics.

**LB1142 (HHS) Provide for emergency plans at the youth rehabilitation and treatment centers.** The bill outlines the specific requirements for an emergency plan for when a facility faces an emergent situation and allows for temporary placements. Would allow for 7-day emergency placements in other facilities.

**LB1143 (HHS) Provide duties for the Department of Health and Human Services with respect to establishment of an inpatient adolescent psychiatric unit.** The bill calls for a report and study for the collocation of an inpatient adolescent psychiatric unit at the Lincoln Regional Center.

**LB1145 (HHS) Require the Department of Health and Human Services to develop and implement policies regarding use of mechanical restraints and transportation of juveniles.** The bill requires DHHS to come up with a policy on restraints by October 1, 2020.

Thursday, February 6, 2020

Government, Military & Veterans Affairs Committee

**LB781 (Stinner) Provide for annual continuing education for treasurers of certain local governments and provide a duty for the Auditor of Public**

**Accounts.** This legislation requires county, city, and village treasurers to complete continuing education annually through a program approved by the Auditor of Public Accounts. Treasurer must provide proof of completion to the Auditor. Expense for the continued education will be paid by the county, city, or village of the treasurer.

It requires a city or village clerk acting as a city or village treasurer to comply with requirements in subsection (3) of 17-606. The bill adds duty for the Auditor of Public Accounts to annually approve continuing education programs for county, city, and village treasurers. Auditor must also maintain records of program attendance and notify the county board, city council, or village board if their treasurer is not in compliance. Auditor is also responsible for notifying the Attorney General and county attorney of the county in which a treasurer is located if compliance is not met for the continuing education.

Judiciary Committee

**LB1169 (Cavanaugh) Create the Nebraska Integrated Juvenile Data Governing Body and the Nebraska Juvenile Justice Information System.** The bill creates the Nebraska Integrated Juvenile Data Governing Body. The purpose of the Body is to plan to create and sustain a unified juvenile justice and child welfare center while at the same time answering questions about youth in the justice systems. The Body will report to the HHS Committee and the Judiciary Committee on or before Jan. 1, 2022 and July 1, 2022. The Body shall complete the plan and submit a report to the Governor and electronically to the Legislature on or before July 1, 2023. Section 7 states that UNO's Juvenile Justice Institute will manage the Information System. The Institute must provide information online and provide training and technical assistance statewide on data collection.

Member of a vulnerable population means an inmate who is eighteen years of age or younger, pregnant, or diagnosed with a serious mental illness, a developmental disability, or a traumatic brain injury. On and after July 1, 2019, no inmate who is a member of a vulnerable population shall be placed in restrictive housing. In line with the least restrictive framework, an inmate who is a member of a vulnerable population may be assigned to immediate segregation to protect himself or herself, staff, other inmates, or inmates who are members of vulnerable populations pending classification. The department shall adopt and promulgate rules and regulations regarding restrictive housing to address risks for inmates who are members of vulnerable populations. The department shall not place or retain an inmate in restrictive housing for more than ninety days in any calendar year, whether consecutive or not, due to a security threat posed by the inmate unless there is an individualized determination made by a specialized inmate classification committee. Such committee has extensive procedural requirements for prompt and thorough review of the specialized inmate issue. Many due process type requirements are mandated, such as, timely notice, the right to be heard in person, the right to confront/cross witnesses, and an established appeal process. Beware: many other requirements and duties stem from this act. For example: Inmates shall be informed of rules of behavior and discipline. Such rules shall be posted or otherwise made available to the inmates. (And more.)</i>

A consumer between the ages of 13 and 16 and a parent/guardian of anyone under 13 could affirmatively authorize the sale of the information. A consumer would have the right to request a business delete any personal information. However a business would not have to comply with the request if the information was necessary to: complete the transaction, provide a good or service requested by the consumer, perform a contract between the business and consumer, detect security incidents, exercise free speech or allow another consumer to exercise this right, engage in public/peer-reviewed/historical/ statistical research in the public interest, to enable internal uses that are reasonably aligned with the expectations of the consumer based on the consumer relationship with the business, or comply with state or federal law. A business would have to make available at least two designated methods for submitting requests for information (at a minimum a toll-free number and a website is the business maintains one). Information would have to be disclosed within 45 days of receiving the request for information (may be extended once by 45 days if necessary). On the business webpage a link would have to be created titled "Do not sell my information" that would direct a consumer to a page to opt out. No account creation could be required to do this. On the linked page, there must be information about the consumer's rights and the business' online privacy policy. Once a consumer as opted out of the sale of their personal information the business must wait 12 months before the business requests the consumer for authorize the sale of personal information. Any business that does not comply would be subject to a civil penalty, brought by the Attorney General, of up to \$7,500 for each violation. This act does not apply to information governed by the Fair Credit Reporting Act, financial institutions subject to the Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act, personal information collected pursuant to the Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act, protected health information collected subject to the privacy, security, and breach notification rules issued by the US Dept. of Health and Human Services, and the sale of personal information authorized by the Uniform Motor Vehicle Records Disclosure Act. The owner of the vehicle has a defense if the vehicle was reported stolen, or the owner provides the name of the driver and the driver admits to operating the motor vehicle at the time of the violation.*

A consumer between the ages of 13 and 16 and a parent/guardian of anyone under 13 could affirmatively authorize the sale of the information. A consumer would have the right to request a business delete any personal information. However a business would not have to comply with the request if the information was necessary to: complete the transaction, provide a good or service requested by the consumer, perform a contract between the business and consumer, detect security incidents, exercise free speech or allow another consumer to exercise this right, engage in public/peer-reviewed/historical/ statistical research in the public interest, to enable internal uses that are reasonably aligned with the expectations of the consumer based on the consumer relationship with the business, or comply with state or federal law. A business would have to make available at least two designated methods for submitting requests for information (at a minimum a toll-free number and a website is the business maintains one). Information would have to be disclosed within 45 days of receiving the request for information (may be extended once by 45 days if necessary). On the business webpage a link would have to be created titled "Do not sell my information" that would direct a consumer to a page to opt out. No account creation could be required to do this. On the linked page, there must be information about the consumer's rights and the business' online privacy policy. Once a consumer as opted out of the sale of their personal information the business must wait 12 months before the business requests the consumer for authorize the sale of personal information. Any business that does not comply would be subject to a civil penalty, brought by the Attorney General, of up to \$7,500 for each violation. During this examination period you can be removed by the Department Head without right to appeal or hearing if your work performance does not meet required standards. Upon a satisfactory completion of the probation period you will become eligible for a merit raise.

**Vacation Leave:** As a (Select Employment Status) employee you shall earn paid vacation leave at the factored hourly equivalent of eighty (80) hours per year for full-time employment or prorated for Part-Time employees based on the total hours worked each pay period. This amount increases after five (5) years of service, as defined in rule 19.2 Lancaster County Personal Rules.

**Holiday Pay/ Personal Holiday Pay:** You shall receive holiday pay up to 8 hours of your regularly scheduled work week for ten (10) legal holidays. **Sick Leave:** You shall earn sick leave hours at the factored hourly equivalent of select hours per year hours per year for a full-time employee. Part-time employees sick leave will be prorated based on the number of hours worked.

**Health & Welfare:** If you are a full-time employee your position will include a generous healthcare, dental, vision and flexible spending account plan that you will be eligible to participate in on the first day of the month following completion of a waiting period of (Choose waiting period)

**Retirement Plans:** (Select the 401 (k) plan statement) To be eligible for the retirement plan, employees must work at least 20 hours per week.

## 3-Month and 6/12-Month Check-Ins

### All new Lancaster County employees would:

- Receive a check-in phone call/email from HR once they have been employed for 3 months to see how things are going and if they have any questions.
- Receive a check-in phone call/email from HR once they have reached the end of their 6/12-month probationary period to see how things are going, answer any questions, and congratulate them!
- This communication should also notify employees of their eligibility to utilize benefits that become available after their probationary period.

# Measuring Success and Effectiveness

**Data should be collected and evaluated to measure effectiveness**

- Perform a survey after 6/12 months to measure the effectiveness of the onboarding process
- Track Voluntary and Involuntary Turnover
- Track Retention
- Measure employee satisfaction and engagement on an ongoing basis.

# New and Promoted Supervisory Personnel

Any new or promoted employee that will be supervising staff should receive:

- additional training regarding effective strategies for leadership and managing staff.
- training from HR regarding relevant personnel rules, review of personnel policies, etc.
- information about staff unions and contracts.
- on-going training for effective leadership and support from HR regarding personnel issues.




In the event you are injured at work while performing your job, please follow these steps:

- Get first aid or medical that is necessary.
- Report the injury to your supervisor
- Submit a First Report of Injury regardless of the extent of the injury or whether first aid or medical attention was provided. The form can be found at:

- Some departments keep hard copies of the First Report form. Know where you can find a copy of this form.
- Answer each question, providing the most detail possible. One word answers don't always reflect what really happened.
- If for any reason you can't reach your supervisor to report the injury or you cannot find the First Report of Alleged Injury Form, contact Risk Management at 402-441-7671 to report the incident. We are available to help you with your claim.
- When you are contacted by Risk Management to discuss your claim, please talk with them about what happened and return their calls if they leave you a message. They need to understand what has happened to you in order to help you.

## Employment Discrimination

Employment discrimination may be occurring if you are being treated differently than other employees because of your race, color, sex (gender), religion, national origin or ancestry, age (over 40), disability, marital status, or in retaliation for engaging in a protected activity.

Examples include:

- Failure to hire
- Different terms and conditions of employment
- Harassment
- Sexual harassment
- Termination or forced resignation
- Failure to promote
- Unequal pay or compensation
- Demotion
- Failure or refusal to provide a reasonable accommodation due to your disability, pregnancy, or religious practice

It is illegal for employers to retaliate against employees for making discrimination or harassment complaints or for participating in a workplace investigation regarding discrimination.

## Housing Discrimination

The law protects your right to live where you want, regardless of your race, color, sex (gender), religion, national origin or ancestry, disability, marital status, familial status, or in retaliation for engaging in a protected activity.

Housing discrimination may be happening if:

- You are not shown a property due to pregnancy or status as a parent or care-giver.
- The quoted price is different for you because of pregnancy or children.
- There is a refusal to make a reasonable accommodation for a person with a disability.
- You are asked questions like "How many kids do you have?" "How long have you been here?" "Do you speak English?" "Do you always wear that scarf?"
- You are steered away from or toward specific neighborhoods. "You would fit in well in that area."
- Domestic violence or police reports are mentioned as a factor in denying you a rental.
- Your religion seems to be a factor.

## Public Accommodations

The law protects your basic rights of fair and equal treatment by businesses and facilities that are open to the public. Entrances should be accessible and admission non-discriminatory. You have the right to enjoy any opportunities available to the general public.

Discrimination may be happening if:

- You are closely scrutinized or followed by store or restaurant personnel.
- You are asked for many pieces of identification.
- You are denied a service when trying to purchase a product, such as purchasing food at a restaurant or tickets for an entertainment venue.

Public accommodations include places of lodging, restaurants or bars, entertainment venues, public meeting spaces, sales or rental establishments, public transportation stations, educational institutions, social service establishments, recreation or fitness centers, parks, places of public display.

Facilities that may legally deny access include religious, non-profit organizations, or private clubs or other establishments not open to the public.



### What is Discrimination?

Discrimination may be occurring if you are subjected to unequal treatment by a covered individual, business, or housing provider and this occurred because of your status in one or more of the following categories:

- Race
- Color (complexion, skin tone or shade)
- Sex (gender, includes pregnancy)
- Religion
- National origin or ancestry (country you or your family are from, includes accent and ethnicity)
- Age (over 40) - only in employment
- Disability
- Marital status (single or married)
- Familial status (children under 18, includes pregnancy and seeking the custody of a minor) - only in housing
- Retaliation

### What is Retaliation?

Equal opportunity laws prohibit the act of retaliation against an individual who has engaged in a protected activity. If you engage in a protected activity and believe you have been subjected to a harm because of it, this may apply to you.

Examples of protected activities:

- Complaining about discrimination, including harassment
- Opposing acts of discrimination, including harassment
- Filing a charge of discrimination
- Participating as a witness in a case about discrimination
- Requesting or using a reasonable accommodation, including disability, pregnancy, and religious practices

In most cases, you must file your complaint within one year of the date of alleged discrimination.





- An investigator will interview you and prepare a complaint on your behalf, which you will review and sign.
- We investigate alleged discrimination due to race, color, sex (gender), religion, national origin, age (over 40), disability, marital status, familial status or retaliation, which has presumably occurred at your place of employment, housing or in a business open to the public.

Your case will be reviewed by the Commissioners; you will receive a letter outlining their findings in your case.




## **BUDGET OVERVIEW**

The Lancaster County's adopted budget is a plan to address a combination of state mandates, local priorities, public safety and infrastructure needs.

The Lancaster County Board's adopted budget was completed using the property tax rate of 28.1576 cents. The County Board will utilize .75 cents from the Railroad Transportation Safety District's tax rate.

## BUDGET OF EXPENDITURES




The total adopted budget of expenditures is \$200,275,812 which is a 3.72% increase in comparison to the 2018-19 adopted budget.

The largest portion of Lancaster County expenditures is for employee salaries and benefits (40.13%).

2. Corrections - \$25,958,310
3. County Sheriff - \$13,646,568


## EXPENDITURES BY FUNCTION



Public Safety, including Law Enforcement and Other, is 41.11% of the budget. Public Safety-Law Enforcement consists of Corrections, County Sheriff, Youth Services Center, etc. Public Safety-Other includes Courts, County Attorney, Public Defender, etc.

General Government is 2nd at 21.42%. General Government includes the County Clerk, County Treasurer, County Assessor/Register of Deeds, etc. The largest dollar amount is for transfers between funds.

Public Works is the 3rd largest function at 15.88%. Public Works consists of the County Engineer and Noxious Weed Control.




## GENERAL FUND EXPENDITURES

The total budget of expenditures for the general fund is \$122,675,020 which is an increase of \$6,542,586. This results in a 5.63% increase over the prior year.

What is driving the increased costs?

1. Lancaster County and the City of Lincoln are implementing a new HR/Payroll system. Implementation costs for Lancaster County is approximately \$900,000.
2. Additional \$3 million will be allocated to the County Engineer's budget.
3. Payroll costs are increasing by \$1,923,561 (2.95%). An additional 10 FTE's were hired mid year last year so this is the first full year of costs - \$850,000.
4. Board of Equalization costs - Residential Revaluation.
5. Increase in Jail costs - \$857,290.

## BUDGET OF REVENUES

Taxes are the largest source of revenue for Lancaster County (54.79%). Taxes consist of Property Tax, Motor Vehicle Tax and Inheritance Tax. Inheritance Tax is deposited into the General Fund and is utilized to decrease the amount of property tax required.

Fees in the General Fund are decreasing because revenue collected by the Youth Services Center is estimated to decrease by approximately \$985,000 due to a projected lower number of kids to be housed during 2019-20.


## Cash Reserve - General Fund

The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) recommends the cash reserve be no less than two months (16.67%) of regular general fund operating expenditures. Based on the recommendation from the GFOA, the General Fund's cash reserve should be \$19.6 million. The cash reserve is setup to help cash flow during months of limited property tax collections. Lancaster County is making an effort to increase the General Fund cash reserve. The new cash reserve amount will be \$8,130,699 which is an increase of \$1,940,699. Cash reserve will need to be a budget discussion item each year because the new reserve number is only 6.6% of the general fund operating expenditures.

## Fund Balance - General Fund

The General Fund balance at July 1, 2019, was lower than the previous year by \$1,353,575. The reduction in fund balance was included in the calculation of property tax needed to balance the budget.



Property Taxes increased by 12.9%. The total amount of property taxes for the adopted budget is \$80,276,884.

















The County Board recently reviewed the status of the 2018-19 County budget, as well as some additional costs which we will be facing during the next few years. Several important issues are worth noting:

1. Payroll costs, which include benefits, increase on an annual basis by approximately \$2 million.
2. Current property tax reduction proposals before the Legislature could have an impact on our spending and revenue choices.
3. Lancaster County has future needs in regards to building projects and technology upgrades.
4. Lancaster County has a future need to increase cash reserves to maintain an adequate level for cash flow purposes.

The new budget platform called OpenGov will be utilized for the FY2019-20 budget requests. Budget numbers will be entered into OpenGov and additional spreadsheets and supporting documentation will be attached. Service Based budgets will also be completed again for FY2019-20, to explain the link between services provided and annual cost.

The County Board is challenging each department to review their work and the services they provide and identify ways to become more efficient, if possible.

The Board will ask each department for updated information on future building projects and technology upgrades as we plan for future budget years. The budget instructions will include additional information on the spreadsheet.

Out of state travel should be included in your FY2019-20 budget request and will be discussed with your department at your budget hearing.

Please review all revenue accounts in depth and indicate any potential revenue shortages or changes. After the budget requests have been reviewed and the Board has a comprehensive view of fund balances, anticipated revenues, and budgeted expenditures, adjustments will be made to present a proposed balanced budget.

The Board anticipates limited dollars will be available for expansion of services or personnel. However, if a necessity exists, expansion budgets will be separately stated in OpenGov and will be discussed with the Board prior to approval.

Please follow all of the instructions and properly complete all forms by April 16, 2019.

## **ADDITIONAL ITEMS TO CONSIDER**

### **Grants**

Please complete the Federal Grants form listing the federal grants your department has been awarded or will receive for FY2019-20. Include the awarded or budgeted amount, the federal agency awarding the grant, the program title, the CFDA number, the business unit used for accounting purposes, the revenue account, any positions funded by the grant, the grant period, and any county match.

### **Computers (Technology Fund)**

As in the past, the Board will budget for computers funded with property tax dollars in the Information Services budget. Please identify your FY2019-20 need and obtain a cost estimate from Information Services. Your request for FY2019-20 along with the estimate must be submitted at the same time as your budget.

### **Cutoff on Expenditures**

The cutoff to notify the Purchasing Department for FY2018-19 purchases over \$50,000 will be May 1 and the cutoff for purchases less than \$50,000 will be June 15. The last date for sending payment vouchers to the Clerk will be June 30. Payroll will be accrued through June 30.

### **Salaries**

Salary cost-of-living increases will be budgeted by the County Board in the General Fund Contingency budget, unless the increase has been approved in contract for the upcoming budget.

**Managing your FY2018-19 budget from now to June 30 will be helpful. Unexpended amounts will increase year-end balances, thus, reducing next year's tax requirements.**

The County Board realizes the budgeting process requires substantial effort on your part. However, adequate documentation and timely submission of your agency's budget request is essential to determining the spending levels of the County in line with the revenues available.

For the Treasurer's Office I anticipate no major changes to our overall current fiscal year budget.

As for future expenditures for the next year, overall I expect normal increases. I am looking into some reorganizing of staff to make better use of resources. At this stage, the plan is for changes to be incremental with minimal budget increases. Other possible financial expenditures may include upgrading furnishings at the downtown location dependent on the outcome of our next door neighbor's remodel.

On the income side I do want to note that in the last few weeks we have been seeing a decrease in the rates we have been able to obtain for our investments. In the last month we have had to take rates as low as 1.8% and have been offered way less. This in contrast to the last year when we had been getting rates at 2% or higher.

Per your request, I have reviewed the Election Commissioner (607) budget for FY20. I am estimating that there will be several areas in our budget in which we will exceed our original budget.

After reviewing the Election Commissioner (607) budget, I am anticipating that we will need an additional \$19,000 for FY19 for our regular office budget. This is mostly a result of increases in salary and benefits.

In addition, my office will also expend an additional \$325,000 for the Lincoln Public Schools Special Election which is scheduled for February 11, 2020. The School District will also pay the entire cost of this election which will increase revenues for our office to match the expenses.

I hope this assists you in your budgetary planning. Please understand that these are my best estimates at this point. The vast majority of our remaining funds in the Election (607) budget will be spent during the final three months of the fiscal year due to the Statewide Primary Election to be held on May 12, 2020. Dear Mr. Meyer:

As requested in the Memorandum from the Lancaster County Board of Commissioners dated December 19, 2019 this letter is to provide requested updates to the District Court’s budget for fiscal year 2019 - 2020. This memo addresses both the District Court and the District Court Referee’s Office.

The 2019-2020 District Court’s adopted budget was \$2,881,916. With projections based on the previous six months it is projected that there will be a shortfall of approximately \$10,700.

It does appear that Court Appointed Attorney Fees (64120) appear to be on track at this time and the estimated shortfall could very likely be absorbed by reallocating other budgeted items.

One area we would anticipate seeing the need for additional funds in the next two years would be for the completion of the courtroom audio visual project in FY 2020 – 2021 which was estimated at \$28,000 for new speakers and microphones.

The primary concern at this time which has been previously discussed with the County Board is the need for a Technology Support Technical with audio/visual experience that could help maintain and troubleshoot the equipment in real time during courtroom proceedings or in chamber hearings as well as troubleshoot day to day technology questions. Oftentimes, the cost of trials can become much more costly if technology is not functioning and jurors need to spend more time deliberating, reviewing evidence, or needing to be sequestered to extend the trial.

In discussion with the County and Juvenile Courts as well as the Clerk of the District Court a fulltime FTE among the four departments would most effectively utilize the resources that are currently available

as well as the possibility of reducing costs further by higher utilization of resources that are currently in place.

At this time, we would anticipate revenues to remain the same this year.

Dear Dennis Meyer:

We are asking for an additional appropriation of \$104,766 for the current fiscal year. Although we discussed allocating funds for Margene Timm's PEHP due to her retirement in our budget materials, we failed to enter the \$77,487 for this item on that line of the budget. Additionally, we made an error in the number entered for the salary of the Chief Deputy of the Juvenile Division. This amount was off by \$27,279. We apologize for these errors.

Regarding major issues in the next two years, we do not anticipate any major capital items at this time. We replace 1/4 of our computers each year and we plan to continue replacing them at that rate. The number of felony cases we opened in the last year declined, especially in the last six months. This resulted in a decline in the number of felonies in which we had to file overload motions from 839 in 2018 to 587 in 2019. The number of overload motions in misdemeanors increased in 2019. We are planning to reassign some attorneys to handle misdemeanors more efficiently. However the overload numbers indicate we could add five or six attorneys, and the County would save money. If these numbers continue, we will probably request two additional attorneys in our budget request this spring. We will continue to monitor this situation.

Hi Dennis:

Here is the information you requested for your mid-year budget review.

I anticipate being close to the budgeted amounts for the budget items except for salaries. The December accounting reports show our department with an unobligated budget of 50.4%. In addition to salary increases, I anticipate a retroactive payroll payout that will influence our second half of the FY expenses. At this point, my guess is that we will be over budget for salaries by \$8,000. Our revenue budget is very close to budgeted revenue and I expect to be close to the budgeted revenue at the end of the fiscal year.

Concerning future-year expenditures, change in staffing may be necessary as we continue to digitize more types of records for more departments. Currently, we are at our maximum scanning capacity and have a hard time filling in for vacation and sick leave absences. We have an old vehicle that seems to be near the end of its life. We may need to find a replacement vehicle, preferably a surplus vehicle from another department. We have aging scanning equipment that is still operating, but we do not have any equipment replacement fund. To be proactive, I plan to include the cost of replacing a scanner in my future Micro PC fund request.

Dennis,

I apologize for the delay in getting my mid-term letter to you but I did want you and the Board to be aware of a couple of items.

1. **Update on the current budget year.** The County Attorney's Office is significantly over on our PEHP which is due to Eileen LeGrande retiring after 42 years. Unfortunately, there will be another large payout when Jan Lipovsky retires April 1, after 35 years with the county. I will need additional funds for the PEHP account.
2. **Future year expenditures.** I will ask the board at the mid-term to approve the attorney I requested for the child support division, at the beginning of the fiscal year. With the already large caseloads the two attorneys handle, it will grow rather significantly with the requirement of establishing paternity on SNAP recipients. The total cost to the county, without any incentive money, is still approximately \$17,127.00.

I will also be asking for another attorney for our criminal division to assist with expanding Problem-Solving Courts and overall expanding needs in the criminal division, due in part to the hiring of traditional law enforcement, i.e. police officer and deputies, and the expansion of technology, like body cameras. Increase in law enforcement means an increase in cases referred, and an increase video means increase in time to review cases. The caseloads for the criminal attorneys in the County Attorney's Office are currently far beyond what they reasonably should be by any measure. Total cost for that attorney, approximately \$96,000.00.

With the additional attorneys, the County Attorney's Office is also in need of some renovations to the existing office space for the additional attorney's office. I have previously sent an email to members of the Public Building Commission setting forth these needs and portions of the 2014 Facilities Report. I believe that email addresses the needs and the previous plans. If need be, I can resend this email.

Per your request, I am providing information regarding our operational expenditure and revenue budgets for the current fiscal year. This information is based on six months of actual data through December 31, 2019.

### **GENERAL EXPENDITURE BUDGET**

With 6 months of expenditure history, we estimate a FY2020 budget shortage of \$325,000. The below factors are a driving force behind fiscal year shortages.

We will continue to monitor the below categories on a monthly basis:

- Salary Line items (61210, 61250, 61310)
  - With the 2.5-3% cost of living increases for Unrepresented and FOP 32 correctional officers, our salary line items (61210, 61250, 61310) will reflect combined shortages by year end, currently 2% overspent. The Board also requested us to make a \$300,000 cut which came from these line items. The IBEW wage increases have not taken affect yet & will reflect additional shortages in January, 2020 including back pay.
  - We are currently experiencing a strong demand on our Correctional Officer's positions. We have experienced difficulty in recruiting suitable applicants resulting in a higher than normal vacancy rate. In addition, during CY2019, we had 34 inmates admitted to community hospitals at various times. These hospital stays totaled 129 days. On 28 of these days, we had 2 inmates admitted. We must staff these hospital rooms with at least one officer and in some cases, two. We have also experienced a significant increase in our female population over the last 6 years. As a result, our reserve housing unit was open for 273 days or 75% of 2019. This too requires coverage by correctional officers. This has caused our overtime budget to be alarmingly short. Some cost could be offset by insurance premiums with less staff. We will continue to monitor all salary line items.
  - Traditionally, during the first six months of the budget year, the department tends to expend overtime and temporary salaries at a higher rate in comparison to the second half. This is a result of the higher occurrences of leaves of absence, in-service training and higher populations. We are hoping to recuperate some shortages in overtime & temporary salaries in the upcoming months.

- JBI commission for SCAAP funds will be \$26,400.(6710.64150) We discussed encumbering these funds in FY19 but did not due to deficits. This will be overspent by \$16,400.
  - We have caught up on the SCAAP (DOJ) grant that was two years behind. FY18 payment was received in October, 2019. FY19 was just made available for drawdown and should be received shortly. Total received from the DOJ will be \$176,000 this fiscal year.
- Our food service contract (64275) is currently 3.3% overspent or approximately \$40,000. This will likely increase in the next 6 months due to over population and a CPI adjustment coming in February, 2020. In comparing meal counts during the same time frame last year, we have served almost 23,000 more in FY20. If that trend continues due to higher population, we'd be looking at \$80-100,000 deficit including the CPI increase.
- Hospitalization costs (65145) fluctuate continuously and there is no effective way to predict future cases. We project a 6% deficit at the end this month or approximately \$20,000.
- Heating and cooling expenditures (66135-140) are currently on target. Beginning Jan. 1, 2020, DEC/HVAC demand charge will increase by \$12,000 a month, or \$144,000 annually. (up 7.9%) There will be a deficit of \$47,000 (66140). We will continue to monitor this expenditure.
- Other equipment repair & maintenance (66410) is also showing a 10.4% deficit. (\$10,920) We had some significant repairs to the DEC/HVAC system of approximately \$27,000. We are seeing a reduction in our usages with these repairs/upgrades.
- In November, 2019, a semi caused significant damage to our east gate, making it inoperable. Estimated repair costs are \$25,000. We are working with insurance companies to verify fault.


## **GENERAL REVENUE BUDGET**

At this time, we project revenues will exceed requested budgeted amounts by approximately \$200,000. We have currently received 69.2% of the FY20 revenue budget.


## **FUTURE CONSIDERATIONS (FY21)**

At this point, I do anticipate our request for FY2021 to include 7 additional correctional officers. This is an added expense of \$460,000 annually.

As you can see with the chart below, our female population has exceeded projections and we have needed to open our reserve unit to safely house them. To date, we have absorbed the staffing of this unit with overtime and on-call officers. I see no indication that this trend will reverse itself going into the future and will likely continue to increase. Considering this reserve unit was operational 75% of 2019, I believe it is more cost effective to increase our staffing and reduce our use of overtime. The ongoing use of overtime to staff this post has become a drain on morale and may be a contributing factor to staff turn-over.



- There has been an 18.5% increase in the female population between 2014 and 2019.
- There has been a 6.2% increase in the male population comparing the same years.
- ADP for the first six months of FY20 was 649.5 in comparison to the same time period in FY14 of 580.4 or a 10.6% overall increase.

## **OVERALL**

Both Revenues and expenditures are on target for this fiscal year. We will continue to provide updates to potential impacts to both revenues and expenditures as they become available.

## **POTENTIAL LEGISLATIVE IMPACTS**

The Center is reviewing some currently proposed legislation (LB230 and AM 450) and its potential impact on the facility. We will continue to update the Board as we progress through the review process and as bills are passed/not passed this session.

## **FUTURE YEAR EXPENDITURES**

### **Security Systems**

- \$5,000 Employee Badge Stations/Secure Door Access
  - Replace existing keypad code stations at 5 doors. The keypad codes are original to the building and time consuming to update access rights manually at each station.
- \$2,000-\$20,000 Youth Security Safety Check System
  - Replace individual security check module or if not available replacement of the system.
  - There's potential to have this integrated with the CJIS system so this project is on hold until there's more known about the direction of CJIS.

### **Transportation**

- \$25,000 transportation van and safety/security accessories.
  - Current transportation vehicles are over 10 years old and require more maintenance.

### **Computer Equipment**

- \$3,000 for laptop and projector for structured educational programming services during non-school days, evenings, and weekends.
- \$15,000 replacement of 10 agency workstations and 4 laptops.














